In this new five-part documentary *Biblical Archaeology Review* editor Hershel Shanks travels from Galilee to Jerusalem in search of the first-century A.D. world in which Jesus lived and died. This non-denominational film, produced by the Biblical Archaeology Society, is the first and only documentary focusing on the archaeological evidence of Jesus and early Christianity.

- Features Shanks interviewing eminent archaeologists and New Testament scholars about the sites associated with Jesus and other gospel figures.
- Includes visits to Nazareth, Sepphoris, Capernaum, Bethsaida, Kursi, Jerusalem and Qumran, the site where the Dead Sea Scrolls were discovered.

#### Part I: GALILEE Beginnings

Trace Jesus' roots and discover why some scholars think he was born in Nazareth, not Bethlehem. Understand the archaeology of Nazareth and the other Galilee towns of Jesus' early life. Explore the Roman town of Sepphoris and visit the remains of the synagogue in Capernaum where Jesus preached at the start of his career.

#### Part II: GALILEE Fishing

Visit the towns where Jesus' apostles lived and worked around the Sea of Galilee. See evidence of the lives of ancient fishermen and relive the discovery of a boat from Jesus' time recovered from the shore of the lake.

#### Part III: QUMRAN and the Dead Sea Scrolls

Visit Qumran, the Judean desert home of the Essenes, the Jewish sect that likely wrote—and hid—the famous Dead Sea Scrolls. Hear experts' thoughts on what these enigmatic texts reveal about Jesus, John the Baptist, early Christianity, and the Jewish context of Jesus' teachings.

#### Part IV: JERUSALEM Footsteps

Walk the streets of the city Jesus knew, visiting the remains of Jerusalem's first-century homes and monuments, including its recently discovered ancient theater, and explore the tombs of the Kidron Valley. Hear about the accidental discovery of the long-buried original Golden Gate, through which Jesus made his triumphal entry.

#### Part V: JERUSALEM Tombs

Visit the traditional sites of Jesus' crucifixion and burial—the Garden Tomb and the Church of the Holy Sepulchre—and explore which one has the better archaeological claim. See evidence of Roman crucifixions and visit Potters Field, where Judas Iscariot took his own life. Understand what the bone box (or ossuary) inscribed "James, son of Joseph, brother of Jesus" —which recently made headlines—can tell us about Jewish burial practices of the first century.

Educated at Haverford College (B.A.), Columbia University (M.A.), and the Harvard Law School (LL.B.), Mr. Shanks specialized in appellate litigation with the United States Department of Justice before going into private practice. His many legal publications include *The Art and Craft of Judging: The Decisions of Judge Learned Hand* (Macmillan, 1968).

In 1975, after a trip to Israel piqued his interest in biblical archaeology, Mr. Shanks founded BAS and started publishing *Biblical Archaeology Review*. In 1987 he stopped practicing law to devote himself full-time to BAS.

Mr. Shanks's numerous books on biblical archaeology include *The Mystery and Meaning of the Dead Sea Scrolls* (Random House, 1998), *Jerusalem: An Archaeological Biography* (Random House, 1995), and *The Brother of Jesus* (Harper SanFrancisco, 2003, with Ben Witherington III).
